

TULSA OPERA PARTNERS WITH DVIS AND THE FAMILY SAFETY CENTER TO SHINE A LIGHT ON INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE

TULSA, OK, December 20, 2024 — Tulsa Opera introduces Opera Echoes, a new, free community conversation series, designed to leverage its platform to shed light on the intersection of opera and its impact on modern issues. The series premiere, entitled *The Tragedy of Carmen: Domestic Violence and the Operatic Stage*, takes place in partnership with Domestic Violence Intervention Services (DVIS) and the Family Safety Center. It focuses on how the opera's artistic depictions of domestic violence and stalking behavior impact real life, and where Tulsans can find resources for interveners and survivors. The event is scheduled for Saturday, January 11, 2025 at the Frossard Auditorium in the Hardesty Regional Library at 8316 E 93rd St in Tulsa, from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m.

"Tulsa Opera strives to be a force for good in our community, and part of that is using the power of music to shed modern perspectives on traditional repertoire and to address critical issues that impact us all," says Artistic Director **Aaron Beck**. "The Tragedy of Carmen is based on one of opera's most popular stories and beloved scores, but it also exposes the devastating consequences of control, obsession, and violence—realities that affect countless lives in our community. Through our premiere

Opera Echoes event, we aim to spark meaningful conversations about the epidemic of domestic violence in Oklahoma and the urgent need for awareness and action."

The event features a resource fair beginning at 10 a.m., with exhibits from The Demand Project, the YWCA, Oklahoma Coalition Against Trafficking, Oklahoma Equality Center, DVIS, and the Family Safety Center; a performance of excerpts from The Tragedy of Carmen by Tulsa Opera's Filstrup Resident Artists, and a panel discussion moderated by Deon Osborn of the Black Wall Street Times. Panelists include Julie Goree, Staff Attorney with Legal Aid Services of Oklahoma; Kayla Colon from DVIS; Suzann Stewart, Director of the Family Safety Center; and Dr. Crystal Hernandez, an independent mental health consultant and Chief Forensic Officer for the Muscogee Creek Nation. The discussion will center around intimate partner violence, stalking, and ways in which performing arts organizations can ethically present traditional repertoire that includes these issues.

"If art imitates life, some stories are going to be violent and even deadly," said **Tracey Lyall**, Chief Executive Officer of **Domestic Violence Intervention Services**. "By having a presence here at *The Tragedy of Carmen*, a show that enacts abuse and violence, we hope to help spread awareness of our services and reach more people who need our help. Think about 1 in 4 women, and 1 in 7 men, experiencing physical violence by their partner in their lifetime. Now think about a full theatre. How many survivors could be in those seats?"

The Tragedy of Carmen is a 90-minute condensed piece derived from **Georges Bizet**, **Henri Meilhac**, and **Ludovic Halévy's** famous 1875 full-length opera, based in turn on **Prosper Mérimée's** 1845 novella, *Carmen*. It tells the story of a fierce, independent Roma woman whose passionate romance with a disgraced Spanish nobleman-turned-soldier ends in tragedy when his jealousy and obsession spiral out of control. A dramatic, colorful story illustrated by some of opera's most beloved tunes, Carmen's tale is one of the most popular and frequently produced operas in the canon. Tulsa Opera will present two performances of *The Tragedy of Carmen* on February 21 and 23, 2025. For more information and to purchase tickets, visit **tulsaopera.com/the-tragedy-of-carmen**.
